

Greetings Wa:k Community!

We hope you are doing well & taking care of yourself. We were fortunate to have three youth workers join us this summer: Mia Gonzales, Santiago Toro, and Anthony Conde. Mia worked with our office staff, Santiago helped the Groundskeepers crew, and Anthony assisted the Laborers (Fence Crew). They only have a few more days with our department, but we wanted to say "thank you" to each of them for being dedicated to the program, sharing their ideas, working in the heat, and most importantly, learning what our department is about. We wish them well as they move forward in life.

Natural Resources Specialist:

Over the past year the Natural Resources Department has noticed a troubling trend at the Ha:san Cemetery Charco. Any cemetery should be a place of peace for both the deceased and their grieving family members. Unfortunately, that peace has been disrupted by drug and alcohol fueled target shooting at the adjacent cattle tank. Not only is the area being utilized as a shooting range, the household items, general refuse, and alcohol bottles used as makeshift targets are left for the District, and community members to pick up and haul out. Additionally, the cattle tank infrastructure has been vandalized via bullet holes, ultimately degrading the integrity of the pipe used to transfer water into the tank. Lead, the main component of a projectile, is an environmental contaminant that leads to lead poisoning of our livestock, our wild animal relatives, as well as the individuals that eat meat harvested from these animals. We implore you to find a more appropriate location to exercise your constitutional protected second amendment right.

Greetings from the SXD Housing Department

Preparing your home for summer, prioritize maintaining your cooling system, inspecting, ensuring safety, and keeping outdoor areas clean and maintained. These actions will help you stay comfortable, protect your home from damage, and enjoy your summer.

Cooling system maintenance—. To ensure your air conditioner runs efficiently and effectively during the summer, remember to change filters regularly, clear the area around the outdoor unit, and schedule professional maintenance

Declutter your yard to deter snakes and rodents this summer, focus on eliminating elements that attract them: **food, water, and shelter**—don't leave food outside it can attract rodents and other critters, eliminating standing water, remove shelter areas, store piles of wood and other debris away from your home, Check outdoor furniture snakes can hide under furniture, be vigilant when checking areas around your home.

Water usage during the summer months residential water consumption in Arizona can be up to 70% higher in the summer than other times of the year, mainly due to outdoor irrigation.




