Greetings, Wa:k Community! We hope you enjoyed the holidays with your family and friends, and wish you a healthy & joyous 2026! First off, we would like to recognize Marlon Parra, Monica Valenzuela, Miranda Flores, Dwayne Salway, Michael Lake, and Hunter Bothof for taking an interest and providing their time to assist with picking up the toys for the Toys for Tots distribution last month. Their help was greatly appreciated!

Also, last month, our partnership with EcoTruths for the Indigenous Youth Fall session came to a close with a “Community Knowledge Sharing Event” held in the Council Chambers on December 7th. The EcoTruths Youth Group spent much of their time at the Hikdan respectfully taking in the sights and sounds of the various forms of vegetation and wildlife they encountered. The group seemed to really enjoy the 15-minute “grounding sessions.” This relaxing, silent activity helped some group participants find balance and connect with Jewed Ka:cim (Mother Earth). While walking around at the Hikdan, most of the youth would stop to feel the moist soil with their hands, and during this, it was mentioned that it was a form of therapy to touch and feel the earth.

The EcoTruths Youth group also made a couple of site visits to Madera Canyon & the San Pedro River this session. These visits offered the youth places where they could make connections with the water, mountains, and sky. While out at Madera Canyon, the youth visited the hummingbird sanctuary and took many photos of the colorful hummingbirds feeding, as well as trying to identify other bird species found at that elevation. Later in the session, the group was invited to visit a protected O’odham ancestral site along the San Pedro River. Some of the ground evidence suggested that this site was contemporaneously occupied by Hohokam and later by Sobaipuri O’odham. This is a fraction of the group’s past activities, a good part of the program focused on Native poets & poetry. In the end, at our sharing event, the youth shined for the parents, grandparents, friends, and guests. One participant shared 3 of her poems, another young person shared his photos & experience at Hikdan, there was an art piece presented that was anti-border wall, another person shared their art piece of the San Pedro River, and the last youth shared her environmental statement and closed the event with a Native children’s song.

Currently, the EcoTruths Youth group is taking a short break, but will start up again for their Winter Session in mid-January with a winter activity. The group is then scheduled to provide an update on their assigned project to the SX District Council in February 2026.

A:ñi 'añ hab ce:gig Michael David Anthony Enis. Ñ amjed i:ya Wa:k tab, D o añ Wa:k Himdag Events Coordinator. Here is some information to share. There are many ways O'odham Himdag is shared and understood. Let this be one source for you as you read and even listen.

During this month, O'odham gather in different ways to keep many traditions. Some traditions have been kept for generations, and some are new.

Ho'ok A:gida (O'odham Legends) are usually shared during cold nights. O'odham long ago would listen as an older family member would share the Ho'ok A:gida and remind everyone of the stories and the lessons learned from them.

Wi'ihiñ 'A:gia (Flood Story) we hear that I'itoi floods the world, having everything restart again. The Ban (Coyote) does not want to be washed away and killed, but he knows the life he was living was not right. He was ashamed to go up to I'itoi, but he does, and in the story, we hear about the journey the Ban takes and the help he receives. We can learn from Ban and this 'a:gia. We can know that we can be given second chances, and we, too, can give them.

A person could hear the same story the same way but might have a different viewpoint or understanding over time, as they age.

While authorizations were being obtained from the Tohono O'odham Nation (Nation), the San Xavier District (SXD) and San Xavier Cooperative Association (SXCA) spent countless hours meeting with the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) to plan and design projects. As discussions progressed, BOR's engineering, environmental staff and their consultants worked to collect data that would help complete the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) document.

The NEPA process is required for major federal actions that have the potential to significantly affect the environment. Prior to any ground disturbance, the NEPA document was sent to Federal, state and local agencies, along with holding public meetings in the District Center. The public and agencies were able to comment on the environmental impacts. The SXCA Farm Rehabilitation – Final Environmental Assessments (July 2005) link is attached.

Further, the authorization allowed the District to enter into a contract with the Federal Government, specifically with the BOR. Under Public Law 93-638 – Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 450 et seq), the District was able to contract for some of the work and created the SAWRSA Office.


Before any terms were agreed upon, a scope of work, cost estimates, and timelines had to be developed. Once everyone agreed, a contract was signed between the Federal Government (BOR) and the District. SAWRSA staff ensured contract regulations, statutes, and reports were submitted to BOR.

Funding for the projects were appropriated under the Southern Arizona Water Settlement (SAWRSA) and Southern Arizona Water Settlement Act (AWSA) Amendments. The Secretary of Interior acting through BOR is responsible for overseeing the funds for the projects, providing technical assistance and training to ensure we followed the terms and conditions of the contract.

There are many steps, discussions, and approvals that lead to starting and finishing all the projects. At times, there were many activities happening at the same time. In the next newsletter, we hope to provide information on the projects followed by information on the Water Management Plan.

Bus Stop Shelter Project:

The Planning Department would like to announce the beginning of an exciting new Bus Stop Shelter Project. We have recently started a collaboration with a grant-writing firm in hopes of securing funding from the 2026 Tribal Transportation Program Safety Fund provided by the Department of Transportation for nine bus stop shelters throughout our roadways. These shelters will include sun shading and more comfortable seating for our public transit users. This area is no stranger to hot summer days, and these shelters will help to prevent potential heat-related injuries whilst waiting for transportation. Additionally, a more substantial bus stop infrastructure will enhance the safety of many children and the elders by providing a more visible pick-up/drop-off location. This will provide a safety measure against traffic fatalities for years to come. Many of our community members rely on Sun Tran and local school bus services as a mainstay in their day-to-day life, and this initiative seeks to serve that interest.
